COMPLIMENTS OF NWTA AND NWPTA

Want to play some team matches this summer? Here's the program you've been looking for!

USTA/VOLVO LEAGUE TENNIS

All members have received information in the mail about Volvo League Tennis this summer for the Senior Tennis Players Club. This is a recreational tennis program for men and women which divides players into ability levels, using the National Tennis Rating Program (NTRP). You play only with other players within your rating level. (You will be rated and you will be notified of your rating.) Seniors will be playing winners at these levels.

Important points to consider at once:

- -Team captains are needed. You can volunteer by calling Percy Hughes at 545-9184.
- -Play will be outdoors free from mid-May through July. If there is play indoors at the Northwest Racquet Clubs in April, only court fees will be charged.
- -You must be a member of the U.S. Tennis Association, cost is \$16 a year. Bob Larson, President of the Northwest Tennis Association, has agreed that the NWTA will subsidize the dues if not in a position to pay.

Time is short. Call Percy Hughes now.

As you all know, the Urban Tennis Project's goal is to serve Minneapolis youth (ages 7-17) and get them started in the great lifetime sport of tennis.

By volunteering some of your time this summer (as little as 24 hours or as many as 36) you would not only help thousands of youth, but you would also help our Senior Tennis Players Club, Inc. get funds from the Northwest Tennis Association and/or the U.S. Tennis Association.


