By the way, the Play "Doubles" was hilarious. You missed a fun time if you weren't one of the 160 members there.



TENNIS TIPS By Virginia Morgan

Hawaiian Tie Breaker (1 Point)

This tie breaker is usually used when your court time is up and the score is tied.

Either side spins a racquet, the opposite side chooses "up" or "down." The winner serves (usually the better server serves; if in doubt spin between you and your partner to see who serves the point). The receivers have a choice of who is to receive; if in doubt again, spin to see who receives the serve. The side which wins the point wins the match.

Fast Feet, Slow Hands

Use short steps (like a boxer to get in position for balance) unless you have a long distance to go. (Get off your heels.)

Play every point as if it's the final point of the match. It's never over till it's over.

When in doubt as to where to hit the ball in doubles, hit low deep down the middle. The net is 36 inches and goes up 6 inches to 42 at side posts.

Never ever hit a ball at a player across the net from you. The only exception is at their feet. I repeat: Never ever hit at them!! This has been a big complaint of many senior players.

Do you know what they call it when a player hits the forehand and backhand on the same side of the racket? "Windshield washer." The disadvantages are the player's elbow is usually blocking his or her vision when hitting a backhand, and it is harder to return low volleys with the backhand.

If you are the receiver of a serve and the serve is an obvious out, do not hit the ball. Either let it go or gently block it so it stays on your side of the net.
