

TENNIS TIPS by Percy Hughes

BACKHAND VOLLEY: LEAD WITH YOUR ELBOW

Yes! Lead with your elbow! According to one of tennis' most aggressive serve-and-volley players, Billie Jean King, upon studying a lot of photographs of the best volleyers in the game, notice that when they hit backhand volleys, the elbows of their racquet arms were always out, away from their bodies.

This arm position makes a lot of sense, if you think about it. It enables you to meet the ball sooner and punch it back across the net with greater pace and accuracy.

Experiment a bit during practice or when taking lessons. You'll soon discover that the closer you keep your elbow to your body, the weaker your backhand volleys will become. Concentrate on getting your elbow in front of you to meet the ball. Your volleys will quickly become a lot crisper.

Do not confuse these mechanics with ground stroke mechanics—they're not the same.

She had played about a year when she moved to Kiel, Germany, just across the bay from Denmark. She joined a tennis club the first year she lived there, but there was no youth program with free lessons, as was the case in Jena. Unfortunately, no one bothered to introduce her to any of the members, and she was too shy to introduce herself. Consequently, she never played in the year she belonged to the club so she dropped out and didn't pick up a tennis racquet again until many years later in Edina in 1954-married with two children.
