
A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PAST PRESIDENT

THE FARR SIDE:

How to Coexist as a Bigger-Than-Life Talent and Tennis Threat

Tennis opponents of George Farr, 67, always denounce indoor tennis club builders. The reason: because they've never erected their roofs high enough for execution of successful lobs over Farr's Paul Bunyan stature! An octopus-oriented net man, he has an uncanny knack of sensing the orbit of the elusive yellow orb with unerring accuracy. When you total up Farr's talent, a signal flashes in your mind he's also a renaissance man. As we unfold chapter and verse about this last vestige of rugged individualism, Horatio Alger may rotate in his grave.

At 6'3" and tipping the scales at 210, Farr is both intimidating and gazelle-graceful on the court. He has one particular shot where he shortens his grip on the racket and finely chops an adversary into near cardiac arrest. His angle placements seem to defy gravity and hard drives defuzz balls abrasively. With sportsmanlike humility, however, he laughs gleefully when he misses an easy shot. The IDS building in downtown Minneapolis is in serious jeopardy when Farr inflicts his topspin lob.

Many people associate Farr as a former DFL mover and shaker, a truism he proudly assumes. How he achieved that powerhouse pinnacle is a saga in sheer determination, guts and ability. He entered an imperfect world in New York City, later moving to Little Falls, New Jersey (shades of Minnesota), where he graduated from Passaic Valley High School. Then it was on to Rutgers University for a year, interrupted by World War II and a stint as a B-17 pilot and First Lieutenantcy stateside.

After the war he improbably enrolled in Concordia College in Moorhead to study music. In less than two years, Farr graduated cum laude with a B. A. degree—an amazing feat in Concordia history. Not only did he sing the graduation solo at commencement without ever being a member of the famous Concordia Choir, but played end on the football team as a senior. For a spell he did some graduate study at the U of M in English and American literature.

The next five years found him in Comstock, Minnesota as the high school principal. For diversity he taught all the English classes, coached all athletics, directed every drama effort and wrote a play. The prodigal son then returned to Concordia as assistant football and basketball coach, Field House Manager and Director of Athletic Information. He left Concordia in 1957 to become Executive Secretary of the DFL party, his political career kickoff.

Farr ran for State Auditor against a wellentrenched Republican incumbent, Stafford
King, and was defeated in a squeaker. Karl
Rolvaag, then Lieutenant Governor, took him
on as his Executive Assistant for a few
months. A short time later the same year,
Governor Orville Freeman selected him as his
Executive Secretary. His political star was
in the ascendancy. In 1961 Farr became State
Chairman of the DFL party and held that post
for six years—the longest tenure of both
DFL and Republican parties as State
Chairman. He was honored with the
chairmanship of the Midwest Democratic
Conference (14 states) in 1966-67.

Farr joined Piper, Jaffray & Hopwood in 1967 as a stockbroker and advanced later to a vice presidency and manager of the Minneapolis office. In 1979 he joined Allison-Williams Brokers as Executive Vice President. About that time he took up tennis at the Wayzata Country Club (he's an expresident) and discovered he liked the game better than golf. After about eight years as a self-taught player, he was ready for the "big time" and joined the Senior Tennis Players Club--in his words, "to find partners to play with in the summer months."

As if he needed the exercise, Farr plays four times weekly at the Northwest Racquet Club, three at the Williston Club with ageless seniors—and jogs from two to eight miles frequently. Twice a week he takes on Jim Klobuchar of the Star Tribune in

fiercely competitive singles. Farr has his downers with the Klobuchar Klobber!

In 1984. Farr retired for a few days and started George Farr Investments, later in 1989 forming Entec Financial Co. as Executive Vice President. The list of organizations he's headed would fill a single-spaced page; e.g., Methodist Hospital Foundation, Concordia Alumni Association, Premack Memorial Foundation, Hemenway Award Committee, etc. As a singer since childhood, Farr's stage presence is highly professional (his recent performance at our Annual Meeting proof of the pudding). He's been entertaining people for over twenty years-at Dudley Riggs, political rallies, dinner theaters--and is currently preparing a oneman singing/acting show.

Hubert Humphrey has always been his hero despite personal contacts with three residents—Truman, Kennedy and Johnson. Farr has dined at the White House (the Washington, D. C. one) and hobnobbed with a spectrum of political figures throughout the land. He claims the experience has improved his backhand play! No smoke-filled room politico is Farr. He's articulate, witty, charming and a raconteur of the first order. Infectiously friendly, he's all things to all people, no matter what station.

Farr's personal philosophy is not pretentious: "Live life fully because it's the only one you've got." For over 46 years his lovely wife, Patricia, and he have enjoyed the zest of togetherness and sharing with their three children, Bruce, Patricia and Scott. In the year 2000, Farr will still be auditioning for shows and doing his "Walter Mitty Sings" bit anywhere a gig is possible. Words to live by from the Farr Side: "The Senior Tennis Players Club gives all of us new levels of skill, promotes new friendships, keeps me fit and encourages me to never stop doing things."
