We have reserved space on the Jonathan Padelford for a 2 1/2-hour dinner cruise Sunday evening, July 28.



Fred Habegger forwarded an article about a senior league that's a smash hit in Florida with 1550 players competing on 70 teams. The Senior Men's Tennis League includes teams from as far north as Deerfield Beach and as far south as Pembroke Pines in Broward County, Florida.

The league was created in 1977 with 150 members on 10 teams. Today there are 1550 players on 70 teams. The league plays by age divisions, and last season yet another age barrier came tumbling down when a 75-and-older division was formed with 5 teams.

1550 players, all men, is impressive. STPC's latest membership count is 1442. Surely with both men and women we can top the Florida league. Spread the word. TENNIS TIPS by Ginny Owens

I HATE MY BACKHAND

How many times have we heard or said this? How often do we run around what would be a backhand shot and take it as a forehand? If we have a weak or defensive backhand, we should determine if we are using the elbow instead of the shoulder as our pivot point. Use of the elbow as the pivot point prevents us from getting body weight into the shot, and the power comes only from the wrist and/or the forearm. It is extremely difficult to hit deep, accurate backhand drives using the elbow as a pivot point.

How do we remedy this? Here's some homework: Stand in front of a mirror in the ready position, but without a racquet. Let your left hand grip your right hand, now let it pull the right arm straight back. You are still facing the mirror, but your left shoulder has swung around and the right shoulder faces the mirror. Note that the right arm is slightly bent. Let the left

hand drop and swing the right hand forward and up, using your shoulder as the pivot point. The elbow does not lead as you swing your arm.

Now repeat this exercise, but add one more motion. When the left hand pulls the right arm back, you will feel the pull in the shoulder. Just before swinging the right arm forward, take a step toward the mirror with the right foot. When the right arm swings forward, there should be no movement of the elbow, only the rotation from the shoulder. Repeat daily until you have mastered this change so it becomes automatic during tennis play.

One last helpful correction. When actually practicing on the court, be sure to take the ball well in front of your body. If you let the ball get by your side before making contact, you will revert back to hitting from the elbow.

Rarin' Marian:

STPC Membership Chairperson on Cutting Edge of Being the Classic Superwoman

Amateur writers sometimes conjure up weird coined words that baffle the imagination. Take, for instance, this fabrication: pole-eye. To the warped mind it's remindful of a potent booze in this flight of fancy found at the Golden Nugget Saloon in the days of the old Wild West. Imagine this scenario, if you will. Clint Eastwood sidles up to the bar and drawls at the bartender: "Gimme a double shot of pole-eye or I'll crease your skull with my Remington." Barkeeper answers: "Never heard of pole-eye, stranger." Bang, bang, and the fantasy ends.

This is a sneaky, left-handed way to introduce you strangers and friends to our June profile subject, Marian Murphy Pollei. You guessed it - last name pronounced "poleeye." What this small-statured but powerfully accomplished woman has propelled in her lifetime would be worthy of a novel. You will just have to be content with highlights in this abbreviated version. Take five to get your glasses - are you ready?

Born and raised on a farm near Saint Cloud, Pollei got through Saint Francis High School in Little Falls and embarked on a career in nursing. In 1946 she became an R.N. from Saint Cloud School of Nursing and shortly thereafter married Barney Murphy. A dental student at the University of Minnesota, Murphy tragically died after two years of marriage from a kidney disfunction. Pollei sorrowfully recalls that if a dialysis machine could have been available at that time, Murphy might still be alive today. The marriage produced an only daughter, Mary Ellen.

Already a Minneapolis resident, Pollei went on to receive a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing Education from the U of M in 1959. Without knowing it at that time, she was headed for the field of psychiatric mental health nursing. Now involved with the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Saint Cloud, she pursued her education by getting a Master's degree with honors from the University of Iowa in 1970, in her chosen specialty. Five years later she was awarded a certificate in Family Therapy from Family Counseling Associates in Saint Cloud.

Introduced by a mutual friend, she met Jack Pollei in Saint Cloud who was associated with the dry-cleaning business. The romance began in 1975, culminating in marriage two years later. About that time she started playing tennis in earnest, but not with the intent she utilizes today.

Before citing Pollei's other accomplishments let's recap her nursing career in staccato fashion:

- 1951-58 Staff nurse and supervisor of 100 plus nursing staff personnel in psychiatric services.
- 1959-60 Head nurse of a psychiatric service providing care for acutely disturbed patients.
- 1960-69 Instructor for diploma nursing students (860) in psychiatric mental health nursing seminar.
- 1969-70 Member State of Iowa mental health team during graduate study.
- 1970-71 Clinical specialist in psychiatric mental health nursing.
- 1971-72 Adjunct faculty member, College of Saint Benedict/Saint John's University to develop mental health associate programs.
- 1972-73 Acting Associate Chief of Nursing Service for Education at Saint Cloud VA Medical Center.
- 1973-76 Back to Clinical Specialist in psychiatric mental health nursing.
- 1976-82 Again Clinical Specialist in psychiatric mental health nursing with VA Mental Hygiene Clinic.
- 1982-85 Adjunct instructor, U of M Graduate School of Nursing and still to this day a consultant to the U of M's Psychiatric Mental Health nursing staff.

And in addition, Pollei was President of the 12th District Minnesota Nurses' Association for four years, held various offices at the district and state level of the Minnesota Nurses' Association, and was President of the Area Health Education Consortium of Central Minnesota Nursing Committee.

finger is falling off. Maybe I have psychiatric leprosy!

After 31 years of loving every aspect of her VA position, Pollei allegedly retired and with husband, Jack, purchased Nevens Cleaners in Saint Louis Park. After building the business (Marian was Madam President of the firm), the Polleis sold out in latter 1990. Now comes the good part - you know, playtime and all that jazz.

Seeing a Jack Dow inspired ad, she joined the STPC in 1986. "It was my entry into meeting new people because they interest me more than I can say," Pollei reveals. She frankly admits that today, at 66, her whole life evolves around tennis. She's been to Wimbledon twice, but would prefer now to go to the U. S. Open. As a team captain at Nicollet Tennis Center, Pollei ran a good show and was highly respected by her team. She still plays six days a week and is in splendid shape. "Tennis is aerobic, exhilarating and provides me with an outlet for my energy," Pollei says.

Prior to retirement, it should be noted, Pollei learned downhill skiing, cross-country hiking and roller blading. Take heed, all grandmas, that you, too, can become superwomen! Pollei is an excellent gourmet cook and sets an elegant table. When going out for dinner, she prefers Lucia's off Hennepin on 31st. She's into Mah Jong and bridge although no one knows how she fits it into her frenetic schedule.

Pollei's top priority: daughter Mary Ellen married to Bob Spector, and her two grand-children, Mark, 13, and Ben, 9. The family is close and active (what else is new?). Making the most of every minute is Pollei's philosophy of life. "Senior Tennis has helped me maintain my emotional and physical health," she stresses. "I enjoy the sport and it enhances my reputation as a "people person."

A story-teller with a ready sense of humor, Freudian Pollei is a warm-hearted and

gregarious individual who's always looking for new challenges. Should you be looking up in the air when someone is hang gliding over the Grand Canyon, it could be Marian Pollei.

So the moral of this story is: If at first you don't succeed, call the buzz saw! Or better yet - lift up your glasses and drink a shot of that Pollei!


