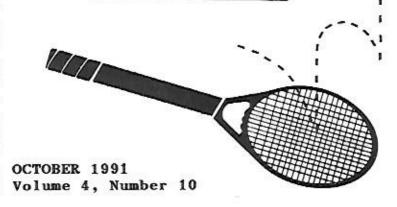

TENNIS TIPS by Virginia Morgan

SAFETY REMINDERS

- Never play with a ball on the court where someone can step on it. Watch for balls behind your opponents; raise your hand and play the point over.
- 2. Never hit a ball to a person unless you have their attention.
- Never backpedal or run backwards.
 Example: If a lob is hit over your head, either turn sideways and slide, turn and pump-run, or let the ball go and lose the point.
- 4. Players have been hurt opening a can of tennis balls. It's a good idea to first read the instructions on the lid.

WATCH THE PROS

Hitting off the right foot (assume right-handed). When going for a forehand return that is wide, rather than stepping on your left foot and stroking, try stepping on the right foot and return the shot. You can get to the ball sooner and reach further.

When returning a serve, as the server is about to hit the ball, either give a quick jump and split step or go step-step-step (right foot, left foot) for momentum to prepare you to return the ball.

Have you ever thought the point was over so you let up and here comes the ball back. Remember, "it's never over till it's over or The Fat Lady Sings!" This helps me stay in the game until the ball has bounced twice or the ball has bounced out of the court—then the point is over.

Twelve Unwritten Rules of Good Courtmanship

The first eight Unwritten Rules of Good Courtmanship were published in the July, August and September SENIOR TENNIS TIMES. To continue--

9) OTHERS ARE WAITING On crowded club and public courts where others are waiting to play, it is both thoughtless and selfish to hog a court. Unless you have hired a court for a specific period of time, it is considered proper to vacate it upon the completion of one set.

10) DON'T ARGUE

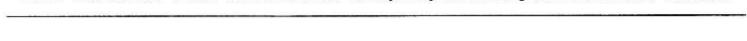
If an umpire and linesmen have been assigned to your match, show
them consideration and treat them with courtesy. In every match you
and your opponent will probably believe that one or more inaccurate
decisions have been made, but as a general rule the linesman is in
a better position than you are to make close decisions. In most
cases you will not be playing with a linesman to call your lines.
Accept your opponents' line calls in a sportsmanlike manner.

HOW DO WE SELF-RATE OURSELVES FOR SENIOR TENNIS PLAYERS CLUB PLAY?

BEGINNER - This player is just starting to play tennis or has limited playing experience and is working primarily on getting the ball over the net; may have some knowledge of scoring, but is not familiar with basic positions and procedures for doubles play.

INTERMEDIATE - This player can place shots with moderate success; has achieved stroke dependability and direction on shots within reach, including forehand and backhand volleys, but lacks some control when trying for power; seldom double faults on serves.

ADVANCED - This player has begun to master the use of power and spins; has sound footwork; can control the depth of shots and has the ability to use a variety of shots, including lobs, overheads, approach shots and volleys; is able to place the first serve with power and accuracy and serve and volley with some success; is seldom out of position in a doubles game.

EXPERT - This player can execute all strokes offensively and defensively with power and/or consistency; can hit dependable shots under pressure; has good shot anticipation; can regularly hit winners or force errors off short balls; successfully executes lobs, drop shots, half volleys and overhead smashes most of the time; can hit winners or force errors with both first and second serves. Return of serve can be an offensive weapon.

Lifetime Achievement of Charles W. Britzius Only Surpassed by His Tennis Prowess



If you took a dozen high-profile achievers listed in the Who's Who in America publication, they might equal the career of one, Charles W. Britzius, 80. This solid rock in a sometimes world of gritty sand has stood far above his contemporaries

in the field of civil engineering for a multitude of years.

To enhance the opinion just offered, Britzius recently received an Outstanding Achievement Award from the University of Minnesota at the graduation ceremony of its Institute of Technology. He was honored as a distinguished graduate. respected consultant for and founder of Twin City Testing Corporation and as a nationally recognized civil engineer. As if that weren't sufficient, he was further cited as the former competent Mayor of Deephaven, his home for 44 years, and as a dedicated leader in community, church and educational organizations. His other professional attainments are numerous as his profile unfolds on these venerable pages.

Taking his first breath in Rochester, Minnesota, circa 1911, Britzius graduated from Central High School. Not only did he excel in football and basketball, but he competed in the first state high school tennis tournament staged at the U of M. Ambitious and eager to succeed, he enrolled at the U of M and graduated in 1933 with a Bachelor of Science degree. In the next five years he acquired a Masters degree in Civil Engineering and became a registered C.E. in Minnesota.

Starting up the ladder, Britzius worked for Hall Testing Laboratories from 1933-36; U of M instructor the next year followed by a year's stint with the Minnesota Highway Department; founding and becoming president of Twin City Testing and Engineering Laboratory from 1938-79 while leading the Soil Exploration Company from 1955-79; and CEO of Twin City Testing Corporation from 1979-85. Since 1985, Britzius serves as a consultant to the Huntingdon Research Centre.

Enter the irrepressible Jack Dow at the inception of STPC and Britzius found himself a charter member. Having a tennis court in his backyard for many years didn't deter Britzius from joining, but probably gave him an advantage while competing with Dow. "North Star was the first indoor tennis club in the Twin Cities," Britzius fondly recalls, "and what a pleasure it was to be able to play all winter long. With my five living children (a daughter passed away last year), we all play tennis on my court and the doubles matches become heated at times," he echoes.

Professionally, Britzius ia a member of Minnesota and National Society of Professional Engineers; 1958 state president, 1962-64 national director and 1965-67 national vice president of latter groups; past president and district director of the American Society of Civil Engineers and other important posts.

His civic activities range from the presidency of the Midway Civic & Commerce Association; former Councilman and Mayor of Deephaven; past chairman of the Southwest Area Sanitary Sewer District; past president of the U of M's Institute of Technology Alumni Association; past member of Boy Scouts of America and Viking Council executive board; Kiwanis Club past president; Board member of the Urban Tennis Association and other groups.

Active in church endeavors for many years, Britzius is a past board member of the Martin Luther Manor Home for Aging and Northwestern Lutheran Theological Seminary; past board member of Gustavus Adolphus and Carthage Colleges; and member of Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in Excelsior. He has served as Past National

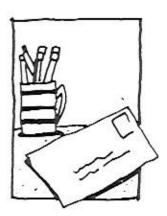

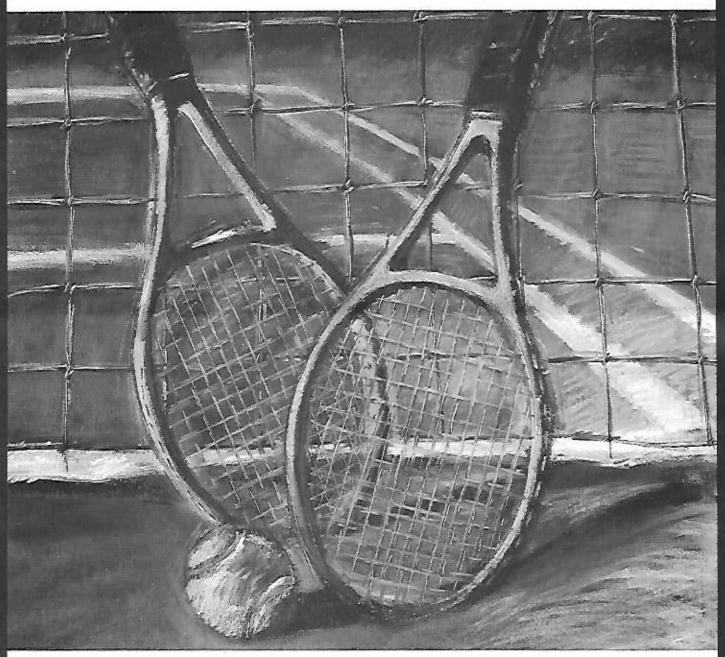
