# This Month's Tipster: Percy Hughes

Summer is upon us and we will play most of our tennis outdoors. Sun and wind are two of the playing conditions that we'll need to adjust for now, which demands total concentration. You must see the ball to the strings on all strokes. Two of the most difficult strokes in these conditions are meeting the service toss and overhead smash.

A tip from the late great tennis educator Frank Voight was: "Make yourself actually see the ball hit your strings and count to two after contact before taking your eyes off the racquet. You will still have time to see where you have returned the ball."

Remember, all you tennis players, see the ball to the strings.

P.S. And don't forget your water bottle and cap or visor!



Molly Culligan, STPC member, was profiled in the Star Tribune on March 14 in an article by staff writer Kay Miller. Molly, actor and playwright, performed in a one-woman play she cowrote entitled, "Solo Flight," at the College of St. Benedict. The play is based on the life of stratosphere balloonist Jeannette Piccard, a Minnesotan whose irregular ordination in 1974 as one of the "Philadelphia 11" pushed the Episcopal church to sanction the ordination of women.

In the article, Molly explains how her development as a dancer, actor and singer helped make the connection between her mind, body and soul. "I want to help people climb back into their bodies—melt the demarcation line between our over-structured heads and our up-tight bodies. The Irish chuckle over how analytical Americans are, and I'm one of the worst—all the more reason I'm interested in the soul and the body...Let the mind take

care of itself. My work is a celebration of sensuality and spirituality."

Another STPC member, Ed Rapacz, also appeared in the Star Tribune. Ed was recognized for receiving the 1993 Distinguished Volunteer Service Award from the Hennepin Parks Board of Commissioners. Ed participated in many outdoor education and special events programming, such as maple syrupping, cider making, full moon walks, the winter Osseo program and the Bluebird

project. Since 1990, Ed has logged over 818 volunteer hours for the park system.

Park officials noted how well Ed researches his subjects, and that the programs he presents are very professional. They also mentioned that Ed has a "fan club" that comes to his full moon walks at the Eastman Nature Center!

# Connie Custodio was Born with a Tennis Racquet and Ball in His Hands

Connic Custodio, 61, is quite possibly the most active Twin Cities tennis teaching professional and competitive player in the past five decades. In fact, when someone recently asked Connie's father, Mike, what his offspring did for a living, the blunt answer was: "He plays tennis!"

You're with the majority if you don't know Connie was an illustrator and draftsman for such companies as Univac, Frontier Engineering and Dacon Engineering for nearly 30 years. His love for tennis has been greater than all the rapture a Don Juan could effect in a lifetime.

Physically diminutive by today's standards, Connie is a giant on the tennis courts. His ready smile and sense of humor is infectious. He teaches beginners with patience and tenderness under conditions that could drive most people bonkers. His indefatigable energy encourages his students to try harder, and the results are a reflection on his abilities as a teacher.

Born in Minneapolis, Connic graduated from the nowdefunct West High School and went on to St. Thomas College for two years before entering the service.

He took up tennis at the age of 12 in Loring Park, taught by the mother of a girl he wanted to date. The mother's tennis lessons became more important to him than dating!

Another teacher was the author, Dan Brennan, who not only taught Connic the basics of tennis but provided him with literature to read, from the classics to contemporary works. (Connie repaid this largesse by later teaching the Brennan children how to wield a tennis racquet.) Another one of Connie's teachers was Lenny Brawerman, who still plays tennis at the age of 77.

Playing in informal leagues, Connie got some great tournament experience by taking on all comers from all over Minneapolis. In 1962 he joined Nick Pappas to work in the Inner City Tennis arena, which is still one of his favorite projects.

He then went on to teach at

Nicollet Tennis Center, Sports and Health clubs and summer camps. He was head pro at the Carleton College Tennis Camps for four years and also at Carleton College. With pro Jack Roach, he taught tennis at Roach's camps to further refine his teaching skills.

In 1979, Connie joined the Northwest Racquet Club as a teaching pro, and remained on staff for eight years. He later joined in with Chuck Supplee to teach seniors at Mankato State University, later shifting with the same group to River Falls for three years.

Currently semi-retired, Connie works at Williston-Sagedahl Sports and Health Club in Minnetonka and can be seen scurrying around the courts like a teenager. He has been involved in tennis fund-raisers at Minikahda, Flagship and Woodhill Country Clubs and is probably the most-recognized tennis celebrity around these parts.

It's difficult to believe that with all the tennis history Connic has compiled, he took a breather years ago to marry his wife Sally and have one daughter, Cathy. The Custodios have three grandchildren and one greatgrandchild.

Connie is not only a devotee and player of Hawaiian guitar music, but at one time danced in the Festival of Nations. One of these days the STPC social committee should induce him to perform—sort of a dance drill to equate tennis drills.

When asked about his philosophy of life, Connie would only say: "My avocation and vocation are one and the same—tennis. It is so much a part of me that I would do it for nothing."

Say Custodio—I could use some lessons at the nothing price you quoted!
