- Many of you have served as eager and willing students whenever I have conducted USPTA testing of new teaching professionals—often when asked at the last minute.


The most helpful thing STPC has provided me and the community is your attitude. You do everything with great joy, enthusiasm, and caring.



Captains' Profiles

JoAnne Christensen

Although actually a shade taller, JoAnne Christensen is the epitome of "five foot two, eyes of blue." The petite Christensen, who captains a women's league at Wooddale, is also upbeat and positive.

"I have such a nice group of women," she said.
"I'm glad they let me be their captain. I consider it a privilege!"

Christensen is a native Minnesotan. She was reared in tiny Dundee (pop. 189) in the southwestern part of the state, where, as a teen, she helped out in her father's grocery and meat locker business. She's since lived in Austin and the Twin Cities. But her favorite travel destination is a far cry from home. Christensen has been to Bangkok, Thailand four times.

How can a place famous for Buddhist temples,

hot spicy food, and a climate ranging from suffocating to hot, attract a small town Minnesota woman—who's a Lutheran to boot?

She's also a mom. One of Christensen's two sons, a financial analyst, was relocated to Bangkok by his employer. Christensen goes there to visit him and his Thai wife and their two children.

Another, not so extreme, destination for Christensen was Roland Garros in France for the French Open. She attended this major tennis event in 1994 with her

daughter, who was then an exchange student in Vienna. They were thrilled to witness Martina Navratilova and Goren Ivanisevic play, although both lost their matches.

Travel obviously is high on Christensen's list of favorite pastimes. Being with her children and (five) grandchildren, reading biographies and nonfiction, and walking or running at Roseville's Central Park are not far behind. But tennis ranks number one. If there were any doubt, "Tennis isn't a matter of life

and death...it's more important than that!" is boldly calligraphed on Christensen's personal stationery.

"It never dawned on me that I really wanted to play tennis forever until I got into STPC," said Christensen, a beginner when she joined. "It was then I got bitten by the bug."

Christensen became a member in 1992 following the death of her husband, Bob. Like other newly widowed persons who've joined STPC, she credits the exercise and new friendships made through regular play with helping her through this difficult time.

Christensen also emphasizes that tennis wasn't something she shared with her husband: "It was outside our marriage and circle of friends. It was mine, not ours. It was part of me starting a new life."

Bob Christensen was an attorney in Saint Paul. He shared a general practice with his father, Irving Christensen, in the firm, Christensen and Christensen.

Bob and JoAnne met while attending the University of Minnesota. They married in 1961. Bob got his law degree from William Mitchell College of Law. JoAnne, who worked her way through the University as a long distance operator for Ma Bell, earned a BS in elementary education. She taught fourth grade in the Twin Cities at Lowry School and Smith School for two years. But rearing a family took precedence and she became "a full time mom for twenty years."

The Christensen's two sons and daughter are all graduates of Saint Olaf College. Tom went on to earn a law degree, Scott, a doctorate in international relations, and Teri holds a business position in marketing.

"I'm really proud of my kids," Christensen said.
"I've never been sorry that I stayed at home to care
for them."

Reflecting her optimistic outlook on life, Christensen's advice for better tennis is, compliment, don't criticize your partner; if someone wrongly criticizes you on the court, finish the game, then speak to that person privately.

And as her league consists of all women, keep the play going--chat later!

Playing Nice: Encouraging Civility on the Courts

There are rules and customs governing the playing of tennis that promote fairness and civility. Some of you might not be aware of them—after all, how many of you have read the USTA Rule Book? Here are a few "rules of the road" that are frequently violated. Look them over and mention them to your playing group if you think they're being ignored. Playing nice makes tennis so much more enjoyable for everyone!

Any call of "out," "let," or "fault" must be made instantly, otherwise the ball is presumed good and still in play. In this connection, "instantly" means that the call is made before either opponent has hit the return or the return has gone out of play. Most importantly, the ball is not out until it is called out.

If there is a clothing, shoes, equipment, or racquet malfunction during a point, the point will be finished before any corrective action is taken. After the point is over a reasonable delay may be allowed for a player to leave the playing area to repair shoes, clothing and equipment.


