Strategic Planning

Part 1: the Mission Statement

The first of a series of articles on STPC's strategic planning by Jim Tornoe, STPC Treasurer

Few things are easier to put off than planning for the future. Just ask a 20-year-old about retirement plans—huh?, a 40-year-old about estate planning huh?, or a 60-year-old about "pre-arrangements," and well, you get the idea. But thanks to Al Uhl's persistence over the past couple of years, your Board has undertaken (shudder) strategic planning.

The Board recently had a workshop to learn what strategic planning is and is not, and how we might go about the process. Most processes follow a sequence somewhat like the one below.



- · Developing a mission statement;
- Identifying internal strengths and weaknesses, and external threats and opportunities;
- Articulating the specific issues to be confronted;
- Developing an action plan to resolve the issues, if possible.

In short, the process is "big picture" and concentrates on a few major concerns.

The journey of strategic planning usually starts with a debate in an attempt to identify the core purpose of an organization, the "who we are" to our members. It is not all-encompassing, nor does it describe all that we do, but it is the fundamental principle on which we are based. That's exactly what we did—we debated, argued, wheedled, cajoled, and even got irritated until we agreed on a mission statement, adopted by the Board in October, as follows:

The primary purpose of the Senior Tennis Players Club is to provide tennis playing opportunities to people 50 and older for their mental, physical, and social wellbeing.

After working through a mission statement, president Dick Lidstone appointed a Long Range Planning Committee of Shirley Pratt, Ron Liddiard, Bill Connell, with Jim Tornoe as chair. The results of this committee's discussions will be the subject of next month's article.



Playing Nice: Encouraging Civility on the Courts

By Bob Tischbein—There are rules and customs governing the playing of tennis that promote fairness and civility. Some of you might not be aware of them—after all, how many of you have read the USTA Rule Book? Here are a few "rules of the road" that are frequently violated. Look them over and mention them to your playing group if you think

they're being ignored. Playing nice makes tennis so much more enjoyable for everyone!

In doubles, when one player calls a ball out and the partner calls it good, and they do return the ball into the opponent's court, a let is authorized.

The code of the USTA says that if you call a ball out, return the shot in play to your opponent's side of the court and then immediately correct that call to good, a let is authorized and the entire point is replayed. Honest mistakes are made when you play without an umpire.

If you are outside of the court and a ball touches you before it lands out you lose the point. If you are inside the court and a ball touches you before or after the first bounce, you lose the point.

Save Those Balls!

Attention, Captains: Percy Hughes asks that you hold onto your used tennis balls. They will be needed next spring for tennis instruction and drills. Arrangements will be made to collect them at a later date and turn them over to Percy.




Captains' Profiles

Vicky Stahlberg

isn't even a senior. But Vicky is special to every captain and player at Wooddale Rec, where she is the receptionist. We've come to expect Vicky's cheery greeting when we arrive for tennis and her kibitzing and joking afterward, as she collects our \$5.50 and serves us coffee.

Even so, Vicky remains unfailingly upbeat, without a trace of self pity; intent on brightening our day. And this is not a pose, she is just being herself.

We treasure this remarkable woman and marvel at her courage. Yet most of us know little more about her.

Vicky was born 47 years ago in Benson, Minnesota. Her family moved to Kerkoven, Onamia and finally Minneapolis, where Vicky graduated from Roosevelt High in 1968.

She is "100% Swede," her maiden name, Johnson. Marrying young at 18, Vicky and husband Ray Stahlberg have three sons and one daughter: Jeff, 27, Melissa, 25, Jerome, 19, and Joshua, 17. They live in Cottage Grove.

Ray has worked at bowling alleys since age 15, when he was a bowling machine mechanic. Today he manages seven bowling alleys in the Twin Cities area.

Vicky's brother, her only sibling, died tragically eight years ago, killed by a drunk driver in an auto accident.

Before coming to Wooddale in 1989, Vicky worked as a secretary-receptionist for Continental Can Co. in Minneapolis and a home daycare provider. Her job at Wooddale Rec began as a fluke. Son Jeff, who worked there as a DJ for the roller

skating end of the operation, told Vicky they needed a receptionist. "They hired me sight unseen," she said. "I love it—and you seniors are one of the reasons I love it. In my condition I couldn't work anywhere else."

Vicky was diagnosed eight years ago with ocular melanoma in her left eye. Surgery and radiation stopped the growth of the tumor, which she says is the "largest ever radiated." She lost the sight in her left eye, but was otherwise okay until last year, when it was discovered that the cancer had metastasized throughout her body. Amazingly, Vicky so far has little pain.

"I have a friend with terminal cancer who is my inspiration," Vicky said. "She came to all her son's soccer games in pain. If she could do that in pain, I can keep a positive attitude without pain."

Veteran Wooddale captain Bob Western speculates, "I have always wondered whether Wooddale Rec is aware of the great ambassador of good will that Vicky is in her dealings with our seniors. There are many good reasons why we love her and pray for her."

Jeanette Busch, who commutes from Glenwood City, Wisconsin, adds, "If it wasn't for Vicky's wonderful welcome to Lorraine Dickman and me each time we came, we probably never would have kept coming, because it's a 51-mile drive one way. Vicky's one in a million—and she makes me feel that way, too."

"Vicky is Wooddale tennis," declared Bev Sinniger, a longtime player. "She creates the atmosphere for Wooddale which is warm and friendly. The whole nice feeling of playing tennis there is because of her."

Vicky's final chemotherapy treatment was last month, so she becomes even more special to us every day.

"I love you seniors, and I want to thank you for all your love and support," Vicky said. "I couldn't have gotten through the last year without you. Your gifts and flowers and your prayers and hugs mean so much to me."

It's our privilege, Vicky. Entirely our privilege.


